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## Enrollment and Relocation Guide

This guide will provide you with the necessary tools that will make you self-sufficient in your student life. Given our limited resources, we have worked closely with other units at Goethe University, as well as Frankfurt's city authorities and officials, to edit this guide with the purpose of facilitating your relocation and adaptation to the GSEFM, Goethe University, and the Rhine-Main region.

## The Graduate School of Economics, Finance, and Management

The Graduate School of Economics, Finance, and Management (GSEFM) – based in the House of Finance at Goethe University Frankfurt – constitutes an alliance between Goethe University Frankfurt, Johannes Gutenberg University Mainz, and Technische Universität Darmstadt. Operating in Continental Europe's primary center for financial markets and central banking, GSEFM aims to realize the three universities' joint vision to establish a premier European center for quantitative and research-oriented graduate-level education in economics, finance, marketing, and management.

The alliance between the Goethe University Frankfurt, the Johannes Gutenberg University Mainz, and the Darmstadt University of Technology enables the GSEFM to offer students the teaching and research expertise of a faculty body with outstanding credentials. The almost 70 professors from the three partner universities have previously held appointments inter alia at Harvard University, the University of Pennsylvania, the London School of Economics, the University of Maryland, Universitat Pompeu Fabra, INSEAD, the University of Toulouse, the University of Zurich, the Federal Reserve Board, the Bank for International Settlements, and the European Central Bank.

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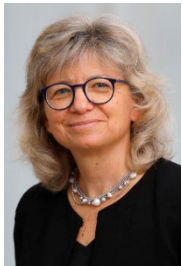

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# How to Enroll at Goethe University

## Enrollment and Payment of Semester Fees

The semester fee is currently €390.28. It comprises several small fees that cover, for instance, the public transportation ticket throughout Germany (high-speed trains not included), and payments to the student's relieve emergency fund, the student's association (AStA), and the group of offices and institutions that provide services to students such as housing, restaurants and cultural activities (Studentenwerk).

Depending on the timeline set by the moment of the admissions period in which you were admitted, you will be informed between June and August by the Student Services office about how to complete your enrollment, and within which deadlines you must pay your **first** semester fee. During the rest of your studies you must pay it within [the general deadlines](#) established annually by Goethe University (in January for the summer semester and July for the winter semester).

Please note that if you fail to transfer the semester fee within the first deadline you will have to pay an additional fee of 30€.

## Goethe Card (student ID card)

If you have submitted a certified copy of your bachelor's degree, proof of health insurance, residence confirmation and paid the semester fee, you can pick up your student ID known as "Goethe Card" at the Service Point of the Studien-Service-Center on the ground floor of the PEG building (see the campus map in one of the following sections of this guide), or will receive it by mail. After that, you must validate it in one of the machines located on the ground floor of most of the buildings located on the Campus Westend. The validation process will activate your card and print the public transportation ticket on it. You must repeat that step at the beginning of each semester.



Goethe Cards are not transferable, so you should not allow anybody to use yours for any purpose. Every student must keep their Goethe Card while in the program and is responsible for the consequences of its misuse. Alteration or falsification of Goethe Cards is subject to disciplinary action.

Your Goethe Card has the following functions:

- Identification:** It identifies you as a Goethe University student. Various cultural activities and institutions (such as the opera house and the city's theater complex) offer discounts for students. "Palmengarten", a botanical garden just across the park adjacent to campus Westend, even grants free entrance to all holders of a student Goethe Card.

<b>Semesterticket (Deutschlandticket):</b>	It serves as a ticket for public transportation <a href="#">in Germany</a> . Please note that if you use the public transportation system without valid proof and are subject to a control, you will have to pay a fine of 60€ or at least 7€ when showing your ticket within 7 days at the offices of the public transportation company.
<b>Kulturticket</b>	It grants you free entrance to <a href="#">twenty museums</a> all around Frankfurt.
<b>Payment:</b>	You can use it as a payment method at all canteens and cafeterias on campus, or on the copy machines located all around the campus. Across all university campuses you will find machines that will enable you to transfer money from your bank account to the Goethe Card.
<b>Key:</b>	You can use it to close and open lockers distributed all around the campus, and to access some spaces on campus Westend, such as the library in the House of Finance and GSEFM study rooms on the fourth floor of the same building. All students can access the building and the fourth floor study rooms on a 24/7 basis.

## HRZ Account

Every student at the GSEFM receives an HRZ-account upon completed registration at the Goethe University. HRZ stands for "Hochschulrechenzentrum" and can basically be considered as the central IT-administration of the university. This account serves as log-in for the computers on campus. Please note that access to the computers in the House of Finance (HoF) comes from a different source described further down.

The HRZ-account also serves as your access to the wireless internet connection found on all campuses. Please make sure that you save your log-in data as soon as you receive them.

Along with this account comes an email address that will consist of your user name and the suffix *@stud.uni-frankfurt.de*. That username will be composed of a letter and several digits, so it could make sense to create an alias using the function available on the email management site. To make sure that you don't miss any emails, you can set up a forward-rule that will automatically redirect them to your desired email address.

Your HRZ-account is also your log-in for the QIS/LSF system, which is the university's official administration platform containing personal information (like enrollment confirmations) and information on payments made related to the Goethe Card or your semester fees. Some of these functions can only be accessed by entering an iTAN (indexed transaction number) from a list provided by the university after your enrollment has been completed.

Please take into account that in some cases you might need to request specific documents needed for your residence permit application and other issues to the GSEFM Academic Records or GSEFM Office. Please contact the GSEFM team if you are not sure about how to obtain the document you need.

## Deutsche Bahn Bike Rental System

[Register on Call a bike](#) using your Goethe University email. After that you can log-in on the *Call a bike* app and use the system's bikes for free all around Germany (60 minutes per ride). Please note that if you exceed the 60-minute period you will need to pay a small fee. You will be also charged for not returning bikes at designated *Call a bike* stations. ## **University facilities**

GSEFM students have 24/7 access to exclusive study rooms located on the fourth floor of the House of Finance. During your first weeks of studies we will send you an electronic form so you can provide us with the information necessary to activate your access permits to these rooms.

## **Orientation and guidance**

GSEFM Academic Records and GSEFM Office will offer two orientation sessions that will be part of the pre-semester program. You will receive all necessary information about them with the pre-semester program's schedule a few weeks before the beginning of your studies.

## Accommodation

Accommodation can be hard to find in Frankfurt. We have collected a few leads for those of you who have just arrived, need temporary lodgings or a place to settle. Please note that the GSEFM cannot vouch for quality or conditions of the accommodations listed. We will help as much as possible but urge you to take the initiative and actively engage in finding a place just right for your budget, interests, and priorities. **Take into account that there are a lot of scammers around on the internet. Proceed carefully and avoid making advanced payments via Western Union or other transfer services.**

<b>Short term accommodation</b> For the first few days in Frankfurt the local youth hostel “Haus der Jugend” (located along Frankfurt’s Main river) is a good and cost-effective choice.

If you already have housing but find it unsuitable to your needs or just want to shift next semester, please immediately select a place and put yourself on the waiting-list. Talk to all your peers and friends as word-of-mouth is one of the most effective ways!

As some student dormitories only offer rental agreements for twelve months, it is important to plan ahead, especially considering the last few months of the agreement may coincide with the preparations for the Qualifying Examinations.

## Upon Arrival: Register your Place of Residence

After having arrived in Germany, you must register at the Residence Registration Office (*Anmeldeamt, Bürgerbüro* or *Bürgeramt*) of your city of residence within a period of two weeks. You will need to fill a form and to present your passport and a “Wohnungsgeberbestätigung” (confirmation of residence) from your landlord. Please keep a copy of the registration confirmation with you as this serves as proof of address (for example, this will be needed when you open a bank account). Please also note that you must repeat that step anytime you change your place of residence.

The Bürgerbüro is responsible for: registration, deregistration, transfer of registration, residence permits, verification, vehicle registration permits, certificates of good conduct, and pet registration (yes, you must register your pet).

Check the website of the local government for the same information if you are living in a city different than Frankfurt.

## Next Step: Apply for your Residence Permit

The Immigration Office is responsible for the registration and administration of foreign citizens in Germany. After the residence registration (at least 7 days after), non-EU students must register with the Immigration Office (Ausländerbehörde) of your city of residence in order to obtain your residence permit. Please note that as absurd as it may seem, normally the employees at the Immigration Offices cannot speak English, and German is the official language at public offices. It will be wise to bring a friend who can translate for you if your level of German is not enough to complete the process without help.

Please make sure that you have the following documents with you (original and one copy): application for foreign residency, passport, at least 2 passport size biometric photos, rental contract, proof of health insurance, letter of admission to the GSEFM, proof of sufficient finances, and €100-130 for fees, depending on your specific case.

Goethe University offers support to Ph.D. international students for their registration at the Immigration Office. Please contact the Student Services Office for more information.

## Health Insurance

German law on health insurance (SGB V) requires that every student has a valid health insurance covering medical treatment and hospital costs in case of illness. Health insurance companies offer a standard special student coverage which at present runs approximately €80 per month (for students under 30 years).

Given that Goethe University is a state-funded institution, we cannot recommend any particular supplier and urge you to shop around.

## Bank Accounts

A bank account will be necessary for authorizing automatic withdrawal for regular payments such as rent, phone bills, etc. Most banks offer a free checking account (*Girokonto*) for students, so make sure to show your student enrollment confirmation.

When opening a bank account in Germany, you should show your passport, residence registration confirmation, letter of admission, and enrollment confirmation.

## Information on employment

Whether as a research assistant or an industrial production assistant: many students choose to work during their studies.

But while students from the European Union (EU) or European Economic Area (EEA) have free access to the German job market, international students from other countries need a permit from the Agentur für Arbeit (Federal Employment Agency) and the Ausländerbehörde (foreigners' authority) if they want to work more than 120 full or 240 half days per year, which is the regular time allowed with a student visa. The issuance of this work permit largely depends on the condition of the local job market. No time limits apply for work as a research assistant, though the Ausländerbehörde still needs to be informed. In addition, international students from outside the EU or EEA are not permitted to work in a self-employed or freelance capacity.

Earnings depend heavily on experience, the sector and the regional employment situation. Students can hold a mini-job and earn €520 per month without paying taxes. If you work more than 20 hours a week, you not only risk your course performance, you generally also have to pay health, unemployment and nursing care insurance.

It is essential that you comply with labour laws for international students. Your residence permit might be revoked if you break these laws. Please contact [International Sozial](#) at Goethe University, or check the [DAAD website](#) for more information.

## Internal Job Market

The GSEFM offers a job portal site to its students. Job offers suitable for GSEFM program students are collected and updated on the internal job market on a regular basis. You may check here for job offers from the three participating universities as well as occasional external positions and scholarships. Here you will generally find research assistant, teaching assistant, and student assistant jobs.

## Goethe University



Goethe University is among the top international research universities. It offers a wide variety of academic programs, a diverse group of research institutions, and a focus on interdisciplinary approaches to solving complex problems. The university is named after Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, the Frankfurt-born polymath renowned for his exceptional contributions to literature, science, and philosophy.

Founded in 1914 with private funding and inspired by the legacy of the European Enlightenment, Goethe University stands out as a pioneering “citizens’ university” and the history of the university is one of openness and public participation. Today, Goethe University is one of the few universities in Germany that enjoys significant public funding alongside administrative autonomy and the ability to create a private endowment.

As a university with an endowment, a funding model rare in Germany’s system of higher education, Goethe University enjoys considerable freedom from state control when it comes to the details of how a modern university should be run, including the appointing of professors. The endowment that is being built up will be invested specifically in promoting an excellent atmosphere in which to research, study, think, and create.

Situated in Germany’s most cosmopolitan and international city, the university attracts a diverse body of students and researchers from around the world. Students at Goethe University benefit from studying and living in Frankfurt, the largest financial and trading centre in Europe with plenty of opportunities to learn and practice speaking German.

Goethe University has four campuses and 16 faculties:

## **Bockenheim**

It is the first and oldest campus of Goethe University. It is located close to the Frankfurt Fair between the districts Westend and Bockenheim. It is in the process of being vacated and departments have been or will be relocated to either campus Riedberg or Westend. The central, Johann-Christian-Senckenberg, library is still located there.

## **Riedberg**

One of the two new campuses of Goethe University and harbors the faculties of Geosciences and Geography, Physics, Biochemistry, Chemistry and Pharmacy as well as the faculty of Biological Sciences. As you can see, Campus Riedberg combines all of the Natural Sciences.

## **Niederrad**

It consists of a hospital that combines education, research and practice. It hosts the Faculty of Medical Sciences.

## **Westend**

Goethe University's newest and most prestigious campus, which is also where the GSEFM is located. Its construction began in 2004 and is still ongoing. It hosts the faculties of Law, Economics and Business Administration, Social Sciences, Humanities, Educational Sciences, parts of the Psychology and Sports Sciences, Geosciences and Geography, and Linguistics, Cultures and Arts. Also the main office of the HRZ, the International Office and the University Administration are located on this campus.



# Frankfurt

## The City

Frankfurt am Main is a vibrant and cosmopolitan city that enjoys a privileged position as one of Europe's leading financial centers and home of companies such as the German Stock Exchange, Frankfurt Airport and Messe Frankfurt, as well as various others that cooperate with GSEFM. That dynamic life, as much as the city's skyline, conform the image that many visitors associate with Frankfurt. But the city is much more than that: it is a metropolis of contrasts in which skyscrapers combine with medieval architecture, financial businesses with traditional life, ethnic Germans with Germans by choice, immigrants and expats. Frankfurt is a green city where you can reach almost everything by bike, plenty of bars and restaurants, museums and monuments, locals and foreigners.



### One city, many faces

Explore Frankfurt's social and cultural diversity. Walk along the Zeil, Frankfurt's shopping street between Konstablerwache and Hauptwache squares (with more than 14.000 passers-by per hour). You will not only have chances to shop, drink or eat, but will have a glimpse on the local population: from snobbish bankers to punks and street musicians, from locals to tourists and expats.

Continue wandering through Biebergasse street, on the right side of Hauptwache square, and after 650 meters of stores and restaurants you will find the old opera house (Alte Oper) where, among many other classical works, took place the premiere of Carl Orff's "Carmina Burana" in 1937.

Leave Hauptwache square on the left side through Roßmarkt street (in the picture), and wander through the financial district before entering the Central Station district, where peep-show bars and sex shops coexist with international restaurants and hip bars.

### **The River Main: landscape, leisure, culture**

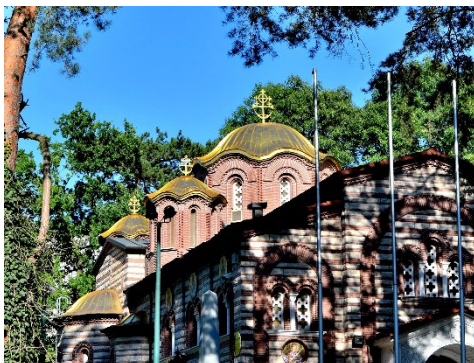
Take a ship tour to Mainz or Aschaffenburg, ride a bike along the Main enjoying the impressive views of Frankfurt's skyline. Drink a beer or Apfelwein (a local variety of cider) while you sunbathe on the grass by the river.



Frankfurt has one of the best constellations of museums in Germany, and most of them are located on both banks of the Main, so step in! Learn about the city in the Historical Museum (in the picture), admire Egyptian, Greek, Roman, Asian and European art in the Liebig and Städel museums, modern art in the Schirn or Museum für Moderne Kunst, or explore the interactive exhibitions in the museums for Cinema and Communication.

### **World history around the corner**

The Grüneburg Park and the Westend Campus of Goethe University, two adjacent grounds located a few blocks from the city center and the financial district, offer plenty of places related to the history of Frankfurt, Europe and the world.



The Grüneburg Park is adjacent to the Westend Campus, and is located on the area once occupied by a mansion surrounded by gardens that belonged to the Rothschild family until 1935, when it was forcedly transferred to the city of Frankfurt under the Nazi dictatorship. The mansion was destroyed during an allied air raid in 1944, but some remnants are still visible. It hosts a Korean garden and a Greek Orthodox church that was built on the ground of the old Orangerie of the Rothschild estate. The park is an epicentre of local outdoor life, specially during the summer, when people meet to sunbathe, perform sports and have picnics.

Part of the Westend Campus of the Goethe University occupies an area that originally belonged to IG Farben, once the world's biggest chemical and pharmaceutical conglomerate, whose researchers contributed to the radical development of the branch with discoveries and inventions like the first antibiotic and the synthesis of polyurethane. After the eviction of its Jewish shareholders the conglomerate developed an organic relation with the Nazi regime, and took active part in the implementation of the Holocaust with the fabrication of the Zyklon B gas used in the gas chambers, and the exploitation of enslaved workforce in factories installed in the Auschwitz Camp Complex.

Nowadays the IG Farben building hosts classrooms and libraries, but it was originally built as headquarters of the conglomerate between 1928 and 1930. The building, that was the largest office building in Europe until the decade of 1950, served as headquarters of the Supreme Allied Command after World War II, and in 2011 was transferred to Goethe University.



The Westend Campus also hosts the ruins of an ancient ice deposit used in a mental hospital demolished in 1928, before the construction of the IG Farben headquarters. The ruin was found in 2008 and integrated to the building of the library of Social Sciences and Pedagogy. It can be seen in the interior of the library.



### **Red-light and gentrifiers**

The main train station neighborhood, or “Bahnhofsviertel” as it is called in German, is small: it occupies around half square kilometre between the main train station and the financial district. But it is also the most culturally diverse area in the Rhine-Main region, since in its cross ways, meet and trade locals, commuters and tourists from all around the world. The district hosts Frankfurt's red-light district, that extends mostly on both sides of Taunusstrasse (in the picture). Beside the occasional Kaiserstrasse farmers market, it also hosts several ethnic supermarkets and shops (particularly on the Münchener Strasse). Both streets are also known because its dynamic gastronomic scene that combines traditional local or international restaurants (Pakistani, Korean, Persian, Chinese, Indian, African among others) with slow-food ones and hip bars.

## Public Transportation

There are several ways for you to move around Frankfurt am Main. Frankfurt's public transportation system is one of the biggest and most busy public transportation networks in Germany.

Streetcars are vehicles that run above ground. Their tracks are often built into a street so that both streetcars and cars share the same road. Their reach is usually limited. Streetcars are referred to by a number, e.g. 51, 33, 11.

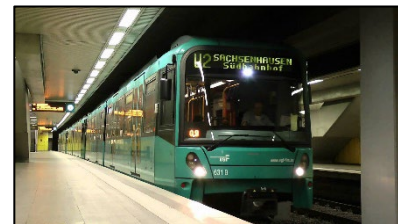
**S-Bahn (suburban train)**

S-Trains run above and below ground and usually travel long distances from outside of Frankfurt to Frankfurt or across Frankfurt to other cities. Notice that all trains halt at the Frankfurt Central Station (Frankfurt Hauptbahnhof).

S-Trains are referred to by the letter S and a number, e.g. S3, S7.

U-Trains usually run below ground but occasionally also ride above ground. Their reach extends that of a streetcar but stays far below the reach of an S-Bahn.

Busses can be found everywhere in Frankfurt. The bus lines are often connected to train stations. Busses are referred to by a number, e.g. 60, 64 or N4 for night busses.

## Culture and Sports

### **Tandem Language Exchange**
